What was the route you took to get to where you are today?

I became involved with ACCP in my 3rd year of pharmacy school. I served as secretary of the Student Network Advisory Committee as a P4. During my first year of my HSPA residency, I served on the Resident Advisory Committee. I was interested in increasing my involvement with the PRNs. I worked with Tammy Malm to further develop our CADM Student/Resident committee. Currently, I am serving as the CADM Secretary/Treasurer.
