Message from the Chair Jennifer Twilla, PharmD, BCPS, FCCP

THE VACCINE ROLL-OUT

How has the vaccine roll-out gone for our members?

The Pfizer vaccine was approved for emergency use on December 11, 2020 followed by the Moderna vaccine 1 week later on December 18. It was at this time that many pharmacists had already prepared for this approval and were

ready to spring into action. However, as any leader would tell you, things don't always go as planned.



To address and hear our team members, the Communications Committee released a poll

to gather thoughts on the vaccine roll-out process. We are still working through the ups and downs of vaccine roll-out and have shared words of advice and wins from our leaders below.

INTRODUCTIONS TO CHAIRS

<u>Jennifer Twilla, PharmD, BCPS, FCCP</u> Chair – CADM PRN

Dr. Twilla received her Doctor of Pharmacy degree from the University of Tennessee in 2008. After pharmacy school, she completed a PGY1 Pharmacy Practice residency at the Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Memphis, TN along with a PGY2 Internal Medicine Residency at Methodist University Hospital in Memphis, TN. In 2010, Dr. Twilla accepted a position at Methodist University Hospital as a Clinical Specialist in Internal Medicine. She practiced as a specialist until May 2018 and then became the Clinical Pharmacy Manager at Methodist University Hospital. Currently, she is the Interim Director of Pharmacy for Methodist University Hospital. She has also served as the PGY1 Pharmacy Residency Program director since 2015. Dr. Twilla has an appointment with the University of Tennessee Health Sciences Center as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Clinical Pharmacy. Since completion of residency training, Dr. Twilla has precepted students in Internal Medicine from the University of Tennessee, Union University, University of Mississippi, and South Colleges of Pharmacy in addition to PGY1 and PGY2 residents for Internal Medicine and Clinical Management. Dr. Twilla has also been highly engaged in scholarly activities, with 40 poster presentations and 37 peerreviewed publications since 2009. In 2018, she was inducted as a Fellow of the American College of Clinical Pharmacy.

<u>J. Artymowicz, Pharm.D., MBA, FCCP, BCPS</u> Chair Elect – CADM PRN Chair – Annual Meeting Planning Committee

Dr. Artymowicz received his BS in Pharmacy Degree from the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science in 1991. He then completed his Doctor of Pharmacy degree at the Medical University of South Carolina in 1993. He then served a PGY-1 (Pharmacy Practice) Residency at the Memorial Hospital at Easton, Maryland. Rich rounded out his formal education with an MBA from Rutgers in 2014. Following Residency, Rich accepted a position as the first Pharmacy Clinical Coordinator at Burdette Tomlin Memorial Hospital (later renamed Cape Regional Medical Center). The position appealed to him because this community hospital held many similarities to the institution where he served his residency, and he saw the opportunity to launch pharmacist managed pharmacotherapy protocols as a cornerstone of the clinical pharmacy services. During his time as Clinical Coordinator, Rich was able to work with the rest of the pharmacy team to introduce heparin, warfarin, TPN, and many antibiotic management protocols. In addition, Pharm.D. students were accepted on rotation, and many posters and a few publications were generated. In 2006, Rich was promoted to Director of Pharmacy Services. He, along with his clinical coordinators, continued to grow the Clinical Pharmacy services by adding technician driven medication history services, antimicrobial stewardship, an, outpatient AC clinic, a PGY-1 Residency Program, and a transitions of care service. In 2013, Rich was given responsibility for the Sleep Center, and the Respiratory/Cardiac Service Line. In 2015, the Wound Center was added as another area of responsibility. Most recently, Rich has been actively involved in the Medical Center's Vaccine efforts, serving as the Health System Vaccine Coordinator.

Dr. Shah is a Team Leader for Pharmacy Emergency Services at Boston Children's Hospital. ANNUAL MEETING PLANNING COMMITTEE

The committee met on November 19^{th} , and then again on December 2^{nd} . Three topics were initially



entertained and included Diversity and Inclusion in Clinical Pharmacy, Leveraging Information Systems, and Pro/Con Debate: Working from Home, is it right for Clinical Pharmacy? After much discussion, and with input from our Board of Regents Liason, the committee decided on an IT topic. Our synopsis was accepted by ACCP in early December, so the session will be titled "Leveraging Pharmacy Information Systems: IT for the Little Guy and the Big Fish". The overall goals of the session will be to give learners a primer of available pharmacy IT solutions, such as those for data mining, clinical documentation, IV workflow, etc....and to provide examples of how these systems have been used in both large and small organization to improve clinical and operation outcomes. Presently, the most pressing matter for the committee is identifying speakers, so the committee will continue to take recommendations for speakers until the presenter slate is finalized.
